Nyakaka Yaul Nyoun, 50, is a widow who lives with her four children in Akobo, Jonglei State. After developing cataract, she lost her much-loved livelihood as a midwife...

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"When I realised I could see less and less, I thought I was getting old, but gradually the problem became worse. I was working as a midwife, but I had to give that up because of my bad sight. I became a farmer, but I had trouble with that too.

"The local clinic could only give me eye-drops that didn't help. I missed my job as a midwife – now my family and colleagues at the hospital had to support me, whereas before I was the supporter.

"One day, I heard of the outreach camps in Nasir – I travelled for two days by boat to get there. I wasn't nervous or scared, I just hoped that I would be treated.

"I was lucky, and got cataract surgery. Before, I couldn't see any faces, but when the padding was removed, I could see my twin sister and niece in front of me.

"I know that without the surgery, I would have gone blind, and am very thankful for the results!"

"I'm very happy and I hope to go back to my job. I know that without the surgery, I'd have gone blind. I'm very thankful for the results!" Nyakaka, 50, is pleased that she can care for new mothers and provide for her own family again.



Thanks to you, Evodia can help to protect the sight of her whole community...

Busy mother Evodia lives in Kesu in West Africa. She volunteers as a Sightsavers Community Directed Distributor (CDD), protecting her village from river blindness...

River blindness is transmitted by a bite from black simulium flies that breed near fast-flowing rivers. It spreads parasitical larvae into a person's immune system, causing inflammation and, eventually, blindness. It can be treated with Mectizan®, which kills the larvae.

Evodia told us: "I became a CDD as I want to help my community. In training, I learned how to give the right dosage of Mectizan® to protect people from river blindness.

"I became a CDD as I want to help my community."

"I get up very early in the morning to distribute it. If people are not in, then I keep going back until I find them. I feel appreciated – lots of people thank me! There are about 10 CDDs in my community and we hold planning meetings twice a week to support each other.

"We also let the community know about river blindness with posters we put up, and announcements in church and at the market."

Nine-year-old Jacob from Kaduna State has been taking Mectizan[®] since he was five. He already understands the opportunities it will give him...

Jacob told us that he takes

as well if you are blind. I want
to be a teacher when I grow
up, so that I can help others."
A good student, Jacob does his

even helps his sister Helen with hers.

Just like Evodia, Jacob's father, Haggai, is a Sightsavers village volunteer. He's been working in his community for two years, preventing the spread of river blindness by ensuring that his neighbours receive Mectizan®. Hopefully, Jacob will be able to follow in his footsteps one day.

Abdul-Rahman is an important man in his village, but he was struggling to carry out his many responsibilities because of advanced trichiasis in both eyes.

He told us: "I had painful burning in my eyes and lots of tears, as if I had something in my eye all the time. It prevented me from doing my work."

So when a Sightsavers surgeon found Abdul on one of his visits, the chief was happy to hear that he could be treated straightaway. The surgeon operated on his left eye on the bench outside Abdul's hut – it took just 20 minutes, and Abdul didn't even flinch.

The next morning, a clearly delighted Abdul told us: "I was so happy to hear that I could have the operation right away, and at home.

My vision is so much better now. The pain no longer stops me from opening my eye properly to see." Now he's set a date for treatment in his other eye and is looking forward to taking part in his village's upcoming harvest festival. Chief Abdul-Rahman is led through his village by his granddaughter to have his dressing removed following his operation.



Doting grandmother Sana lives in a small village called Gumbihini, in the Northern Region of Ghana. She had been suffering from trichiasis for 10 years...

"I had pain in both my eyes. It started with running eyes and it felt like something was in them. I was always rubbing them." Sana went to her local hospital to get eye drops, but they didn't make her condition better.

Thankfully, Sightsavers volunteers found her – and soon she was receiving treatment in her own home. She told us: "I'm glad the surgeon came to my home, because it would have been difficult for me to get to the clinic. I wasn't scared, I was happy!

"Now I can sort maize and have it made into cornflour to sell. I couldn't do it before, and it was hard to raise money to send my grandchildren to school. The surgeon did a great job!"
