Women with disabilities have the same rights as everyone else. But until they can claim them, gender equality will be an unachievable goal.

Women and girls with disabilities are:

- Significantly more likely to experience sexual violence and abuse than women without disabilities
- Twice as likely to be unemployed as men without disabilities
- Three times more likely to have unmet health care needs than men without disabilities
